Dear friends and supporters,

After several years of disruption due to the pandemic, we are now delighted to be re-booting the link society. Salisbury has joined Hereford in a new tripartite link with Muheza in Tanzania, working together to strengthen the bonds between medical services in Tanzania and the UK, and hoping to enrich the lives of patients and the professionals who care for them.



Link Society Visits Restart

In 2023 the link visits started again, both from the UK and from Tanzania. In January a small group from Hereford visited Muheza to re-establish contact and

to discuss the future direction of the link. Drs Karilyn and Richard Collins, and Drs Clare and Steve Scotcher met with members of the link at Muheza Hospital (St Augustine's) and Muheza Hospice and spent a week with the teams there, joining ward rounds, outpatients and home visits. There was a unanimous desire from the teams in Muheza to continue with the link, which has now been in existence for 39 years and has provided a wealth of support over those four decades, as well as numerous educational visits from both Tanzania and the UK.

In October Dr Boniface, a surgeon from Muheza, visited the UK with an intense itinerary involving placements with the surgical teams in Salisbury, Winchester and Hereford. He was particularly pleased to be able to spend time with Mark Szymankiewicz's team in Winchester, continuing his involvement in the Mesh Hernia project that Mark has spearheaded in Tanzania.

Mark (aka Shim) leads the Salisbury arm of the Link Society, having worked as a surgeon at Muheza Hospital for five months in 2018 and 2019. He has established an educational network encouraging improved surgical techniques, especially for hernia repair operations. He is a fairly frequent visitor to Tanzania and maintains a close connection with Muheza.

Muheza Hospice

The hospice in Muheza is one of the oldest in Tanzania, having been established by Dr Karilyn Collins in 2002. It is supported by Muheza Hospice Care, a charity affiliated with the Link Society. Over the 22 years since it was founded the hospice has received many visitors from St Michael's Hospice in Hereford, and several of the staff at Muheza Hospice have visited Hereford as part of the Link Society visits. The two hospices have a longstanding close relationship.

Despite precarious funding, the hospice in Muheza has gone from strength to strength. In October the Hospice Director, Edgar Ngelangela, took a delegation from Muheza Hospice to the first Public Health Palliative Care Congress in Dar es Salaam. Education is considered very important in Muheza Hospice, both for patients and staff. Every day starts with an educational session for all hospice staff, including the many volunteers.

Edgar Ngelangela recently secured funding for a new venture taking palliative care to the prison population in the region. This innovative work started two weeks ago with the first visit to Maweni Prison. The hospice team is proud to be embarking on this challenging new chapter, serving terminally ill prisoners who have never before had any access to palliative care.

Medical Students

Muheza continues to be a popular destination for medical students to spend their medical electives. The students come to Muheza from many different countries including Australia and New Zealand, Europe and Canada. Dr Richard Collins coordinates the student visits and ensures there is accommodation available for them. The feedback from these students is overwhelmingly positive.

Education Fund

The fees from the medical student electives help to support the Link Society's Education Fund. This fund is then available to pay for educational courses for staff at Muheza Hospital and Muheza Hospice who would not otherwise be able to afford the fees. Currently the fund supports Julius Chambi, a palliative care nurse working at Muheza Hospice, to study for the Palliative Care Diploma from Nairobi.

The Education Fund currently also supports Neema Mudu who is studying for her Monitoring and Evaluation in Health. In recent years the fund has paid for 9 degrees and diplomas for staff at Muheza.

New Equipment

The plaster cast cutter in Muheza Hospital had become old and blunt, and a request was made to the Link Society for some replacement blades. The manufacturer, De Soutter, was contacted by the Link Society and kindly provided a new saw as well as new blades.

Link Society Visits Planned for 2024

Several visits are planned both from Muheza and from Hereford.

From Muheza, Emmanuel Kibula and Magdalena Chikoma are hoping to visit Hereford and Salisbury in September. Emmanuel is a general surgeon at Muheza

Hospital who also works in the eye clinic. He is keen to develop his skills in Ophthalmology particularly. Magdalena is a nurse anesthetist who is keen to develop her skills in anaesthetics. They are in the process of applying for visas.

From Hereford, the Collins family are planning to visit in August with their grandchildren. In October a group of five staff and volunteers from St Michael's Hospice in Hereford are planning to visit. This group will include an occupational therapist, a member of the communications team, a manager, a retired physiotherapist and a doctor. In November two play therapists from Hereford Hospital will also visit. One of these, Sarah Brotherwood, visited Muheza 14 years ago, and is keen to go back and introduce her colleague Gemma Mussell to the joys and challenges of paediatric care in Muheza.
